

Dorset Humanists raise £1727* for our Jane Bannister Winter Appeal



From Jude Todd, Nightstop Coordinator, who experienced two years on the streets herself at age sixteen

Thank you so much for the wonderful amount raised through your Winter Appeal in

memory of Jane Bannister. I am so sorry to hear about her passing as we had had several lovely conversations in the latter part of 2012 as she had so thoughtfully asked for gifts at her husband Dennis' funeral to go to New Forest Nightstop. I pass my sincere condolences to you all.

New Forest Nightstop is the only provider of emergency accommodation in the New Forest for young people age 16-24, who find themselves suffering homelessness and this is all done through the homes of trained and approved volunteers. There is absolutely no other emergency provision. hostels or shelters, in the New Forest. The first thing people usually say to me is 'Are there really people homeless in the New Forest?' Unfortunately, this is a reality that people are very much unaware of. The forest is mainly an affluent area with a very rural spread. This means that homelessness, as people usually understand it, goes very much unnoticed. The young people we help are not the street-hardened rough sleepers people typically think of in regards to homelessness but everyday teenagers, suffering a crisis, in need of help and protection.

The main causes of youth homelessness are family breakdown but also it can be through unemployment of the young person or the parent, which can then cause a loss of home or the need to downsize and subsequently they have to downsize family. It can be illness in a family that causes stresses and conflict or an inability to look after other family members. It could be fleeing violence or abuse. 80,000 young people will be homeless in the UK this year; 86% are forced to leave home. Being on the

streets brings its own problems though, having experienced 2 years on the streets myself at 16, I am extremely aware of the dangers and the long term impact this can have on a young person's life. A homeless person is 11 times more likely to suffer mental health problems, 13 times more likely to be a victim of violence or abuse and a third get so low they attempt suicide.

Through our team of 26 volunteers. Nightstop provides free emergency overnight accommodation, meals, laundry, baths, travel costs, toiletries, start-up furniture, food parcel referrals, start-up home energy costs, practical support with benefit claims, housing forms and the progression of their housing case through housing panels, with a multi-agency approach to the best outcomes with the means we have. But Nightstop offers much more than this to a young person, it's so much more than a B&B. A listening ear, a sense of belonging and trust, a future, protection from rape, drugs, abuse, increased employability, offering security to not only the young person but their education; 69% of young people who stayed in the last year were in education, training or employment.

New Forest Nightstop has just entered its 12th year and in that time we have provided over 2000 nights of safety to vulnerable young people from our local communities. Our aim is to save them from reaching the streets and becoming victims there. We are hard at work trying to bring an awareness of Nightstop and the tragedies it prevents to the communities around us. Thank you for your interest, particularly as you are also an organisation whose mission is about saving young people from the streets and its dangers. Should Dorset Humanists affiliate to the NSS?

Dorset Humanists committee member Chris Street will propose at our AGM in March that Dorset Humanists should affiliate to the National Secular Society in addition to our Partnership with the British Humanist Association. Members will have the opportunity to debate and vote on this important proposal.

The NSS was established in 1866 and today champions human rights above religious demands accepting that religion has a place in society for those who want it, but in terms of equality, not privilege. The NSS Secular Charter "campaigns for the separation of religion and state and promotes secularism as the best means to create a society in which people of all religions or none can live together fairly and cohesively. The NSS sees secularism – the position that the state should be separate from religion – as an essential element in promoting equality between all citizens."



The NSS has campaigns for Religion in Schools including opposing publicly funded faith schools, an end to religious discrimination in school admissions, an end to compulsory worship in schools and reform of RE.

The NSS Religion and State campaigns for the disestablishment of the Church of England, removal of the bishops in the House of Lords and campaigns against the growing influence of religion on Government.

NSS Equality and Human Rights campaigns for justice to be based on equality, respect for human rights and freedom of thought, conscience and religion.

The NSS Freedom of Expression campaigns challenge religious threats to free expression. The NSS's 140-year campaign to abolish the blasphemy law in England succeeded in 2008. NSS resists blasphemy laws in other parts of the world where conviction can carry the death penalty. NSS campaigns to remove the word 'insulting' from UK law. NSS opposes modification of the United Nations Human Rights Charter by Islamic nations that would render it ineffective in the area of free speech.

The NSS has campaigns against Child Abuse by members of the Catholic Church.

NSS Healthcare campaigns oppose religious influences in Medicine and are against NHS funding of hospital chaplains.

New members must agree to NSS General Principles:-

- The NSS asserts that people of different religions and beliefs and none should be equal before the law, and that a secular state is the best guarantor of this equality.
- The NSS demands the complete separation of Church and State and the abolition of all privileges granted to religious organisations.
- The NSS affirms that freedom of expression and the free criticism of institutions and ideas are fundamental human rights essential to a civilised State.
- Affirming that morality is social in origin and application, the National Secular Society aims to promote the happiness and well-being of humanity.

If Dorset Humanists affiliated to NSS we would help to promote secularism and NSS aims. By being one of 40 Humanist groups that affiliate to NSS, we could grow Dorset Humanists' membership.

Affiliate group membership to NSS would cost Dorset Humanists £29 per annum.

The World Humanist Congress will feature:



The coloraust Memorial Day at the Lighthouse was another moving and memorable event. We heard the story of Henry Schachter who was born in Berlin in 1939 and only survived because of the kindness and bravery of a Christian family who kept him as a 'hidden child'. If there was an unrecognised knock at the door he would have to hide in a specially-designed cupboard. Both of his parents perished in the death camps. Henry will visit Dorset Humanists later this year.

As well as Jews, Jehovah's Witnesses, black and ethnic minorities, people with disabilities and political prisoners, more than 100,000 gay men were arrested by the Nazis. Second World War experts estimate that up to 15,000 of these men were sent to concentration camps. Some were beaten to death. Others were used for target practice by SS soldiers, who aimed at the pink triangles that gay men were forced to wear. The persecution of



homosexuals by the Nazis remained little known for decades, and it wasn't until 2002 that the German government apologized to the gay community. In 2005, the European Parliament approved a resolution on the Holocaust that finally acknowledged the persecution of gay men. A pink triangle monument honouring gay men and lesbians persecuted by the Nazis was unveiled in central Tel Aviv, Israel, in January 2014.

Nigeria has just passed a new law against homosexuality. Under the new law, any gay couple who gets married will be punished by up to 14 years prison and wedding guests will be jailed for 10 years. Anyone who provides services to a gay

person will be imprisoned for up to five years. George Broadhead, secretary of the Humanist charity the *Pink Triangle Trust*, said 'This draconian legislation is almost as bad as that already in place in Islamic theocracies like Iran and Saudi Arabia. It harks back to the anti-gay legislation enacted in Nazi Germany... The Nigerian Humanist Movement has defended LGBT rights in the country and its former executive director, Leo Igwe, deserves much credit for courageously speaking up for these rights in the country's

deserves much credit for courageously speaking up for these rights in the country's parliament'. The *Pink Triangle Trust* is a member of the International Humanist and Ethical Union whose World Humanist Congress will be held in August in Oxford.
